The Christian cannot be satisfied so long as any human activity is either opposed to Christianity or out of all connection with Christianity.

Christianity must pervade not merely all nations, but also all of human thought.

The Christian, therefore, cannot be indifferent to any branch of earnest human endeavor.

It must all be brought into some relation to the gospel.

It must be studied either in order to be demonstrated as false, or else in order to be made useful in advancing the Kingdom of God.

The Church must seek to conquer not merely every man for Christ, but also the whole of man.

We are accustomed to encourage ourselves in our discouragements by the thought of the time when every knee shall bow and every tongue confess that Jesus is Lord.

No less inspiring is the other aspect of the great consummation.

That will also be a time when doubts have disappeared, when every contradiction has been removed, when all of science converges to one great conviction, when all of art is devoted to one great end, when all of human thinking is permeated by the refining, ennobling influence of Jesus, when every thought has been brought into subjection to the obedience of Christ.
